On last Saturday, WPTP 100.1 FM hosted a Record Signing and Release Party for Chattanooga R&B artist Jimmy Allgood and his new EP, "It's Allgood."

Allgood announced his contract with Fever International Music Group

during the event; and District 7 City Councilwoman Raquetta Dotley presented a proclamation from Chattanooga Mayor Tim Kelly declaring March 26, 2022 as "Jimmy Allgood Day."

"I'm bringing it home, baby," Allgood said. "We're making history right

in Chattanooga."

Allgood's producer is Ronnie King and has worked with Snoop Dog, 2 Pac, Mariah Carey, The Offspring, NOFX and Pepper--among others.

"I'm very excited, because it's going to be worldwide. We've been wait-

ing for this moment right here. It's a blessing and it's an honor," Allgood said of his hit single "Moving On."

This notable occasion and reception took place from 4:30-6:30 p.m. at 701 Hooker Road with a host of Allgood's family, friends, and dignitaries

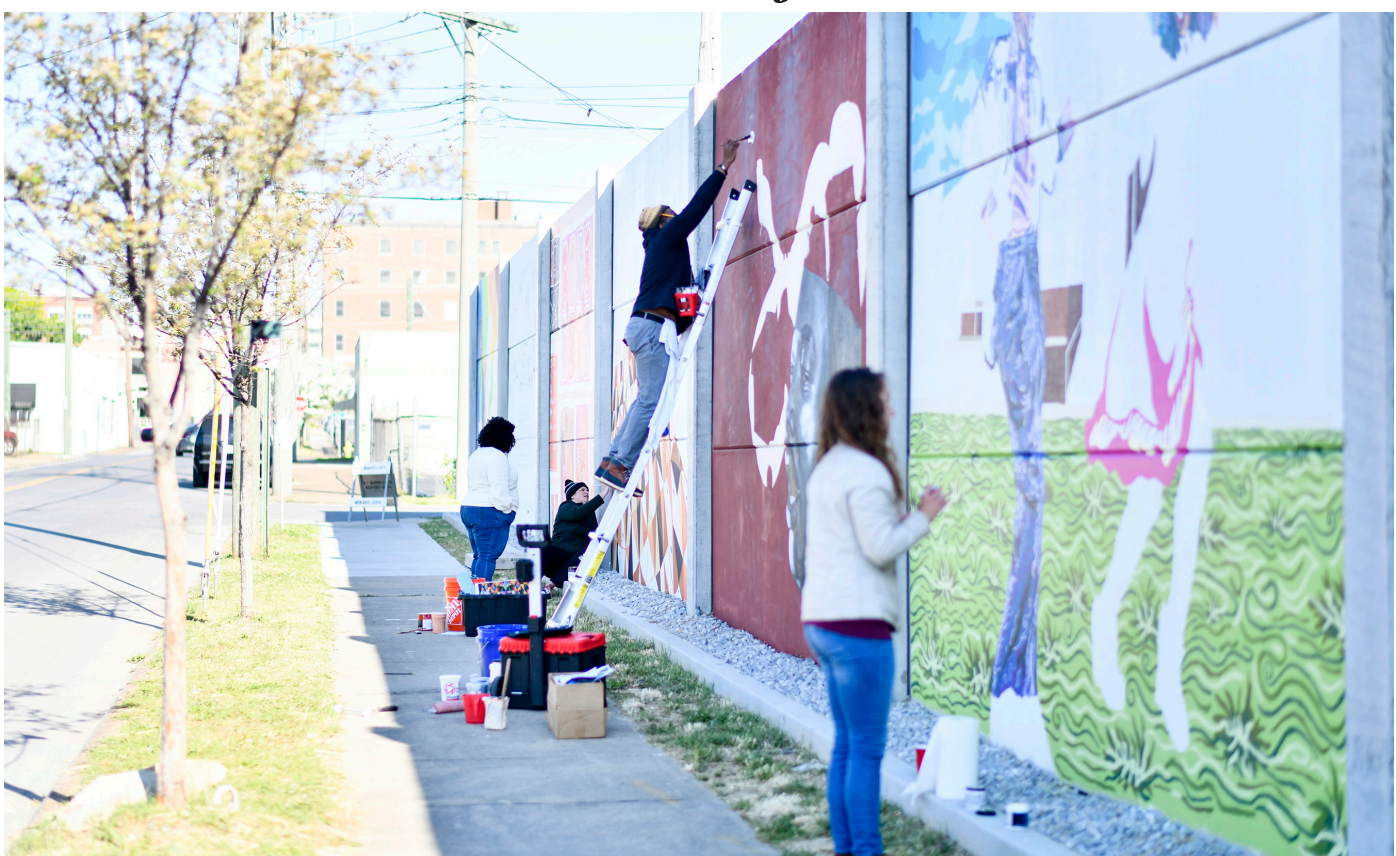
EPB announces 10th Street Mural Artists for Substation Wall

MaryEllen Locher Breast Center T-shirt Giveaway



CHATTANOOGA, TN - The MaryEllen Locher Breast Center at CHI Memorial is giving away free t-shirts to all women who have a screening mammogram during the month of April. The offer is good at all four MaryEllen Locher Breast Center locations and the mobile coaches.

"At the beginning of the pandemic, many women missed their annual screening

mammogram because our centers briefly closed or because they were scared to go to a medical facility," explains Brittany Hennessee, director of breast services, MaryEllen Locher Breast Center. "For the past two years, we've done a lot of outreach to these women, explaining the importance of having a mammogram each year and getting back on track. Unfortunately, some of these women are now being diagnosed with more advanced cancer."

Women do not need a doctor's order to get a screening mammogram. Women of average risk should begin yearly mammogram screenings at age 40. If a woman has a family history of breast or ovarian cancer, she should talk with her primary care physician to discuss when to begin screening mammograms.

The MaryEllen Locher Breast Center has four convenient locations,
