KNOXVILLE, TN — She is 11-years-old and by all indications is going to be a great legislator in the very near future. Nia Vaughn created a bill to make the financial burden on the lives of teachers across the state of Tennessee much lighter. The Teachers Promise Bill will ensure teachers have the supplies they need to stock their classrooms. for the year.

Vaughn testified before the legislature in December and spoke of the needs of the teachers and how covering the cost of the supplies the 78,000 teachers across the state have to purchase with their own money would allow them to buy needed items for their own families. She presented facts and figures and even showed how the current supply dollars amount to only four dollars per student.

Vaughn is an honor student at Karns Middle School, a member of the cheerleading team, the school choir, a sprinter on the Knox Area Youth Track Team and is a competitive baton twirler for Spectra Twirlers. She is an active member at Overcoming Believers Church, and is also a published author. Her book, "The Super Chronicles: Stories of the Power to Make a Difference," was written when she was fiveyears-old.

Her proud parents are Clarence and Syreeta Vaughn and she has two younger sisters, Jada and Zya. Her amendment to Tennessee Law HB 2604 request an increase of \$100 to all of K-12 teachers in Tennessee.

In Chattanooga, Ed Johnson, a black man wrongfully accused of raping a white woman, was killed on the Walnut Street Bridge March 4, 1906. A white mob attempted to hang Johnson, but when their hanging attempts failed, they shot him to death. Johnson had been convicted in a county court and sentenced to death. Johnson's lynching was followed by an unprecedented criminal trial at the Supreme Court, which ordered a stay of execution.

The Walnut Street Bridge in downtown Chattanooga has a history of being a site where lynchings took place.

"Lynching was pure terror to enforce the lie that not everyone--not everyone belongs in America and not everyone is created equal; terror to systematically undermine hard-fought civil rights; terror not just in the dark of the night but in broad daylight," said President Biden.

"Innocent men, women and children hung by nooses from trees. Bodies burned and drowned and castrated. Their crimes? Trying to vote. Trying to go to school. To try and own a business or preach the Gospel. False accusations of murder, arson and robbery. Simply being Black."

tion Commissioner Butch Eley told the Democratic lawmaker that in proposing a month-long grocery tax "holiday," the administration looked at the gas tax and found that the grocery tax would be better relief for Tennesseans.

"As it relates to the gas tax, it's a tax that is gathered at the wholesale level so there are a number of complications," Commissioner Eley explained. "We felt that ultimately the grocery tax was one that every Tennessean could participate in."

In published reports, Republican House Speaker Cameron Sexton said the price tag for the proposed 30-day grocery tax suspension likely would be between \$80 million and \$110 million.

Grocery items are taxable at a rate of 4% (plus local rates of more than 2%) in Tennessee. If Gov. Lee's proposal is cohol, and prepared meals.

His framed and signed photo is showcased alongside many other celebrities and stars on a "wall of fame" at the highly acclaimed City Cafe in downtown Chattanooga.

"We are always proud when Black Chattanooga natives make it big," said Dr. Elenora Woods, WPTP 100.1 FM founder and president.

Allgood credited his success to hard work, determination, and a strong belief in God, and thanked his family, as well as his many hometown fans and supporters.

"I want to give thanks to my mother, father, management team and fans for believing in me and supporting me," he said.
